# Getting Started

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## **For each subject you will need to:**

- Buy a folder & dividers for each subject
- Find out which exam board the pupil is with e.g. AQA & which units the pupil is studying
- Print off a specification
- Print off a copy of the most recent exam paper & mark scheme, for each unit



# Getting Organised

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For each subject produce a revision pack containing:

- A specification
- A copy of the most recent exam paper & mark scheme for each unit
- Student work e.g. mock exams
- Key information sheets containing key terms, equations, diagrams, etc
- Revision notes for each topic/unit



# Revision Notes

Your revision notes could include:

Key information sheets:

- key terms, equations, spellings, diagrams, etc

Revision notes:

- Mind maps
- Revision flash cards
- Post-it notes
- Posters



**Clear and legible handwriting**

**Writing clear, legible notes is a vital tool in the revision process. Use different colours to highlight sub headings, key dates, names etc.**



# S-P-A-C-E-D REPETITION



**Spaced repetition** means revisiting information regularly at set intervals over time.

- The brain preferentially stores information it deems to be important. It strengthens & consolidates memories of things it encounters regularly & frequently.
- Spaced repetition deliberately hacks the way your brain works, forcing learning to be effortful, & like muscles, the brain responds to that stimulus by strengthening the connections between nerve cells. By spacing the intervals out, you're further exercising these connections each time, producing long-term, durable retention of knowledge.

# Using Revision Notes

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- Self-test e.g. key terms
- Post-it notes/posters around your room
- Get your parents to test you
- Explain a complicated concept to someone else
- Practice papers under timed conditions, then self-mark.
