## The importance of Key Stage 4 options

Making the right choice may affect a pupil's:

- Qualifications
- Grades
- Enjoyment of Years 10-11
- Progression after Year 11 and in their future career



## Timeline of the Options Process

- Assembly 1: curriculum pathways - 8 January
- Pathways letter and Options booklet sent home - 9 January
- Y9 Pupil \& Parent Consultation Evening - 11 January
- KS4 Options Evening (in school) - 18 January
- Link to online options form sent home - 19 January
- Deadline for completing options forms - 1 February
- Follow up advice and guidance interviews for some pupils - Term 4
- 2023-24 Y10 pupil timetable published - Term 6

## The core curriculum

- Core curriculum alone leads to up to 7 GCSEs.

## The Optional Curriculum

- Strongly recommend a balanced curriculum.
- All pupils must study at least one subject from: French, Spanish, geography, history and computing
- The only other restrictions are that pupils may choose:
- Only one DT/food course, including catering
- Only one Art/Textile Design course
- Only one Computing/ICT course
- Only one PE/Sport Science course
- Up to two expressive arts courses.


## Key things to think about

- What am I good at?
- What am I interested in and enjoy?
- How do I best demonstrate my learning?
- What qualifications do I need for my next step after Year 11 and beyond?



## The Participation Age

- Pupils have to stay in education until the end of the school year that they have their $18^{\text {th }}$ birthday through one of these routes:
- full time education in a sixth form or at college
- work-based learning such as an apprenticeship
- part-time education or training for at least 20 hours a week if they have a job.
- Pupils not achieving a grade 4 in English and maths in Year 11 continue to study these subjects at college.


## What do I want to do after Year 11?

Sixth Form and then university, employment and/or training

Level 3 college courses, advanced apprenticeships, employment with training

Level 2 college courses, inter apprenticeships, employment with training

Currently need at least grade 4 in English \& maths plus three other GCSEs at grade 5+

Currently need at least five GCSEs at grade 9-4, including English \& maths

Currently need at least four GCSEs at grade 3+
recommended but not compulsory to choose both a MFL and a humanity at GCSE as these will strengthen your university application
recommended to choose a broad range of subjects, which may include a relevant vocational course
recommended to choose vocational subjects and GCSEs that pupils enjoy and are interested in

## The English Baccalaureate

- Not an award nor is it certificated.
- Measure in school performance tables showing \% of pupils achieving a GCSE grade $A^{*}-C(9-5)$ in:
- English
- Maths
- Two Sciences (including Computing)
- A Modern Foreign Language
- A Humanity (RE and Business Studies not included)
- Not compulsory but could be considered for pupils aspiring to go to University as it demonstrates a broad, academic curriculum.


## Cautionary Words

- Not all pupils get their choice, please give a reserve.
- Not all courses are guaranteed to run.
- Late changes are possible but not desirable.
- Most common problem is pupils choosing with friends!
